Speaker Bio

Dr. Jonathan Tarbox is the Director of Research and Development at the Center for Autism and Related Disorders (CARD). Dr. Tarbox has worked in a variety of positions in behavior analysis, including basic research, applied research, and practical work, with individuals with and without autism and other developmental disabilities, of all ages, and their families and care providers. He has worked in public school districts, private schools, sheltered workshops, group homes, developmental centers, professional consultation agencies, hospitals, and community-based recreational programs. His experience includes direct-service provision, supervision, consultation, and program development and director roles. His early career involved positions at the New England Center for Children and the Kennedy Krieger Institute. Dr. Tarbox is a Board Certified Behavior Analyst-Doctoral, and he received his PhD in Behavior Analysis from the University of Nevada, Reno. Throughout his career in behavior analysis, Dr. Tarbox has been engaged in basic, applied and interdisciplinary research and has published articles in peer-reviewed journals, book chapters in behavioral psychology texts, and articles in popular media. Dr. Tarbox's primary research interests include verbal behavior, rule-governed behavior, private events, and recovery from autism.
